How to become a member of the NSCDA

- The first step is to contact the Membership Chair at vtslp@me.com.
- She and her committee will help fill out your lineage papers.
- This requires establishing your lineage to someone in a Colonial State who provided service to our country prior to 1776.
- There are 13 Colonial States and the District of Columbia.
- Once complete, your papers will go to the Vermont Registrar, who, if she finds them in order, will forward them to your Colonial State.
- Once approved by the Colonial State, you will be given a number. This number will have an "A" for Associate Member.
- The Vermont Registrar will assign a VT membership number, and then you are a Vermont Dame!
- Vermont is your Corporate State.
- There are fees for genealogical research at the Colonial state level as well as a one time Vermont initiation fee.
- Annual dues are collected each January.
